We hope for nothing but good things to you as we welcome the warmer weather.











IT'S CRIMINAL: A TIME FOR CRIME

There's nothing like a global conflict to bring out the opportunists. Scamming and price-gouging are two important things to watch out for. Scammers are very active right now. You may get a phone call or email from someone pretending to be a relative, saying they are stuck overseas, lost their passport, or even been arrested. They'll count on your sympathy to believe it's really that relative and you will send them money. DON'T!! Instead, contact the person by another means and verify they are not in fact in trouble. This scam usually involves wiring money somewhere and once it's done there's very little you can do to retrieve it.

Another scam is a fake website created where you can donate money to a good cause. If you want to donate to help Ukrainians in need, make sure the URL of the website is correct. Anything with a strange URL is probably fake. Also, do not click on links in email or social media telling you to click to donate. Pick an organization you know well, make sure you are on their website by checking the URL, and then you can feel good about helping.

Another scam is that of a wealthy person in Ukraine who needs help getting their money out of the country. For your help, they will give you a portion of their money. However, there is no money. They will ask you to first pay a transfer fee to move this money and you will send your money first while the scammer pockets your funds and disappears.

The final scam to watch out for is a message (usually email) from your boss or a coworker instructing you to do something like send a wire immediately. Please contact the sender through another channel and verify they really want it done. Chances are they won't know what you're talking about. If you ever get a message asking you to overlook normal procedures during a time of crisis, do not do anything without verifying. Scammers are very good at creating a sense of urgency to make us do things we know are irresponsible.

Finally, if you have any concerns about your account, call us. We have your best interests in mind.
